# Authority is a powerful tool that should be used carefully

## Why might we get this wrong?

People are ashamed of the Bible

The words of the preacher are treated as the authority

The ego of the preacher

The risk of losing credibility

We as preachers aren't trained well

We have hearers that don't know how to listen

#### How to get this right

# We should train our people to test what we say against God's word.

Acts 17:11 - Now the Berean Jews were of more noble character than those in Thessalonica, for **they received the message with great eagerness and examined the Scriptures** every day to see if what Paul said was true.

## We should avoid eisegesis (exegesis vs. eisegesis)

Exegesis – interpretation of a text so that the ideas of the text come through Eisegesis – putting the interpreters ideas, bias, or presuppositions onto the text

#### Our choice of passage can encourage eisegesis (Expository vs. Topical)

Expository preaching means that we preach from a single text.

Topical preaching means that we might preach from several texts.

"Make sure it is God's trumpet you are blowing. If it is only yours it won't wake the dead, it will simply disturb the neighbours." (W. Ian Thomas)

"My sermon has no authority in it at all, except as an interpretation or an exposition or an illustration of the truth which is in the text. The text is everything. That is the point of authority." (Campbell Morgan)
